More than 700 students have attended Hope Academy since 2006. Students came to Hope Academy from 35 different school districts last year.

As one of the first nationally accredited recovery high schools in the country, Hope Academy utilizes evidence-based practices to provide a supportive community to maintain sobriety while earning a Core 40 high school diploma.

Sobering Statistics

In the United States, an estimated **1,300,000** Americans ages 12-17 are affected with substance use disorder.

21% of Indiana's high school students

report taking prescription drugs without a doctor's prescription one or more times during their life.

7-9% of adolescents in the U.S. meet the criteria for alcohol or illicit substance use disorders.

The cost of educating a student in a recovery high school is **less than 25%** of the cost of incarcerating a juvenile.

80% of adolescents will relapse within 90 days if they return to their original high school.

40% increase in GPA seen in students with more than 200 days of sobriety.
